Making the most of your garden

The return of garden waste collections signals the start of the growing year, from planting early food crops on an allotment to enjoying snowdrops and other new arrivals in your flower beds.

Check your days for garden waste and other kerbside services via My Collection Day at **somersetwaste.gov.uk**. You can also now start a new or additional 12-month garden waste collection at any time during the year via My Waste Services at **somersetwaste.gov.uk**.

As you plan your low-waste garden year, take full advantage of the opportunities for reuse - one important step up the waste hierarchy from recycle - whether repurposing plastic bottles as minicloches or hanging CDs as bird scarers.

Looking ahead can include what you want to grow, and when, so you can

plan your family's future meals, whether tomatoes and lettuce for simple salads, carrots and potatoes for hotpots and casseroles, or fancy edible flowers to be colourful additions to summer picnics.

If you have a garden or allotment, make good use of food waste by composting all suitable materials, from veg peelings to tea leaves. Useful help and a bargain compost bin offer here: **somersetwaste. gov.uk/home-composting**.

Or - especially if "Veganuary" means you have been preparing more veg - go one better by adding all that "waste" to a freezer bag until you have enough to make stock for soups, stews or sauces.

And why not cut waste even more? It is easy to check which plants can be eaten from root to tip, and to regrow veg - herbs or garlic, celery to spring onions - from scraps on your kitchen windowsill.

The upsurge in Covid infections and isolations, together with continuing LGV driver shortages and excess extra waste - especially cardboard - have led to some delayed collections in recent

weeks - for which apologies - and thanks are due to many residents who helped keep pick-ups going.

Despite the pandemic and other problems, there is a lot every family can do to keep services on track for themselves and their neighbours:

- Flatten and tear up cardboard or if preferred, and time, transport or help take any excess card, other materials or rubbish to a recycle site.
- Use only the official boxes, bins and bags - order them via My Waste Services at **somersetwaste.gov.uk**.
- Be sure to put out only what is taken kerbside: somersetwaste.gov.uk/ recycling-collections.
- Help others to recycle, especially those older or vulnerable.
- Report any missed collection after 7pm on the due day using My Waste Service at somersetwaste.gov.uk.
